## 50 Years - Pieces from the Past

This is part of the article that Ed Whalley wrote. From the May/June 1986 Bugle

MDC Acquires Ware River Watershed: Trails & Recreational Use of Quabbin & Ware River Disclosed.

The draft proposals ran to over 20 pages, the bulk of which centered on the Quabbin itself, so I brought up the matter of a perimeter trail around the watershed since the 115 sq. mile holding effectively thwarts the development of any real statewide trail system. The probe produced the horrified response that such a trail would be well over 100 miles long. My reply was that this was the problem precisely and that such a trail would make "one hell of a rotary" for a real statewide system. The MDC suffers from all the classic symptoms of the old PCM&M syndrome (Planning, Construction, Maintenance & Management), and this is reflected in the report itself—the work of eight individuals, each with a proprietary interest. Our big job is to convince them that we don't want to cross through the property, just somehow get around it. I don't care if I even see the reservoir. As far as I am concerned, they could even fence off the trail from the rest of the reservation and give us 16 feet next to Routes 9, 202, 122, 32A and 2 which seem to be the effective boundaries. This would leave the managers in complete control of all that they seen to hold dear and it would give us a start on connect-

ing trails to many DEM holdings north of Rte. 2.

Between the DOT & MDC the means of creating such a "Perimeter Path" should pose no great difficulty.

I am gonna wind this up by relating the perimeter trail concept to the official guidelines laid down by the report to assess the appropriateness of any proposal for recreational activities. There are ten such guidelines:

- 1. A perimeter trail would have zero impact on water quality.
- 2. It would not impact on wildlife, other natural resources, cultural, scientific or scenic values on the reservation any more than the existing perimeter road-
- 3. It would in no way affect the "semiwilderness" character and quietude of the reservation, and, in fact, might even enhance them.
- 4. I consider trail use a passive form of recreation not requiring a great deal of "management & control" particularly if fenced off from the reservation proper.
- 5. Why worry if there are "alternative sites" that might be used if the trail is fenced?
- 6. There would be no "public safety" con-(Continued on page 2)

siderations for the MDC to worry about.

- The potential effects on abutters and local towns should be positive both in terms of diffusing possible problems and in providing slight economic opportunities.
- 8. The Trail would be an excellent candidate for National Recreational Trail status and would enhance statewide trail opportunities.
- 9. Fluctuating water levels would not affect the trail in the least.
- 10. The public benefits stemming from trails development are not only substantial but urgently needed in the face of compressive development. See the last SCORP report.

#### Ware River Watershed Public Access Plan

They have said DCR would not have updates to the draft of the Ware River Watershed public access plan ready for April 20. The updates are supposed to be a result of public comments received by Feb 28.

#### Castle Hill Northbridge Update

The Conservation Commission's April 5th meeting had further discussion on the conservation restriction.

This is what they decided on for horseback riding: Horseback riding will be allowed on the old Castle Hill Road that still has some pavement and extends into the 100-acre lot. There already is extensive invasive species along this section of the road. Trailering and offloading of horses is prohibited and no horses are allowed on other trails.

Someone from the first meeting brought up invasive species being spread from horse manure and who was going to clean it up. Very disappointing that they started with just adding the main road. If you are parked at 100-acre lot riding to Castle Hill it will just be an out and back proposition. Other trails could have been allowed and if there were issues, then scale it back. They put the cart before the horse on this one.
